to support the well-being of individuals as they make their cancer journey. While her career began with research, she is committed to providing psychological care to individuals touched by cancer. In 1992, she was recruited by the Dean of the UCLA School of Medicine and the Director of the UCLA Jonsson Comprehensive Cancer Center to develop a center to meet the myriad psychosocial needs of patients with cancer. Since that time she has served as the Founding Director of the Simms/Mann – UCLA Center for Integrative Oncology.

Dr Coscarelli received the "Outstanding Alumna of the Year Award" for her research in the area of psychosocial oncology in 1987 and the "Distinguished Service to the Profession of Psychology" award from the Los Angeles County Psychological Association in 2007. Dr Coscarelli has practiced as a psychologist in the oncology setting seeing patients and families and delivering a wide range of services to all diagnoses and stages of the disease. Dr Coscarelli also actively educates medical and mental health professionals about the psychology of cancer, survivorship issues, mind-body medicine, and compassionate end-of-life care. Dr Coscarelli, along with her colleagues, developed a multi-disciplinary training program for interns from the fields of psychology, social work and chaplaincy that is also integrated into the center's core. Dr Coscarelli began this work at age 25 and has found deep personal meaning in it. She acknowledges that it has been life altering from the moment of being with her first patient, a 25 year old Veteran with metastatic osteosarcoma. Dr Coscarelli has two daughters, Makena and Katelyn, a step-daughter, Caitlin, and a husband, Mitchell Howard. She embraces her family and friendships with deep gratitude.

Distinguished Public Service Award



Peter Brown and Victoria Sardi-Brown founded the Mattie Miracle Cancer Foundation, a 501(c)(3) Public Charity, in the loving memory of their son Matthew J Brown, or as he was better known to his friends and family as "Mattie." Mattie Miracle is committed to addressing the psychosocial needs of children and families living with childhood cancer, establishing a psychosocial standard of care for childhood cancer patients and their families, and educating health care providers on the impact of such a diagnosis on children and their families. Mattie Miracle believes through increased awareness, education and support, and

advocating for psychosocial support and needs, we can enhance the lives of children with cancer and their families.

Mattie Miracle introduced the first childhood cancer psychosocial resolution in the House of Representatives in May of 2011, which was co-sponsored by Rep. Chris Van Hollen (D-MD) and Rep. Mike McCaul (R-TX). In March of 2012, the Foundation hosted the first ever Childhood Cancer Psychosocial Symposium on Capitol Hill. The Symposium was attended by 80 mental health professionals and lobbyists, representing over 12 states across the country. Mattie Miracle is committed to bringing awareness to the psychosocial issues of childhood cancer and raises funds annually to support this goal on the local and national levels. Mattie Miracle funds a Child Life Specialist position at Georgetown University Hospital, provides a free snack cart to families of pediatric patients at Georgetown University Hospital, and also funds a monthly support group luncheon for pediatric nurses. The Foundation has a presence on Capitol Hill, sponsored a successful Symposium, and is committed to working with psychonocology clinicians and researchers to develop and implement a childhood cancer psychosocial standard of care

Outstanding Education And Training Award



Donald L Rosenstein MD is Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Medicine at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he is Director of the UNC Comprehensive Cancer Support Program. Dr Rosenstein is also Director of the Division of Hospital Psychiatry and the Psychosomatic Medicine Fellowship Training Director in the Department of Psychiatry.

Dr Rosenstein earned his undergraduate degree in psychology from Wesleyan University, his medical degree from Northwestern University

School of Medicine, and completed his residency training in psychiatry at Yale University.

Dr Rosenstein came to the University of North Carolina in 2009 after an 18 year career at the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) where he held several leadership positions including NIMH Clinical Director, Chief of the NIH Psychiatry Consultation-Liaison Service, and Chair of both the Clinical Center Ethics Committee and the NIMH Institutional Review Board.

Dr Rosenstein's awards include the NIH Director's Award and the NIMH Director's Career Award for Significant Scientific Achievement. He is currently Director of the LiveSTRONG Center of Excellence for Cancer Survivorship at UNC and President of the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine.

New Investigator Award



Michael Hoyt PhD is an assistant professor of health and clinical psychology at Hunter College at the City University of New York. He earned his PhD in clinical psychology from Arizona State University and holds a Master's degree from the Tufts University School of Medicine-Emerson College program in Health Communication. He completed his clinical internship at the University of Washington, School of Medicine in behavioral medicine/neuropsychology and an NIMH-funded postdoctoral fellowship at the University of California, Los Angeles in health psychology and psychoneuroimmunology.

Dr Hoyt's research investigates biobehavioral processes associated with quality-of-life in cancer patients. Specifically, he examines coping processes and other psychological factors associated with mental health, neuroendocrine and immune function, and adjustment to cancer and cancer treatment, with a focus on men and male-specific cancers. He focuses on understanding how cognitive, emotional, and sociocultural factors influence physical and psychological adaptation to illness. He has led several large research studies including a trial of men with mixed cancer types examining the utility of emotion-regulating coping processes; an investigation of the relationships of stress and coping processes with neuro-immune and sleep-related outcomes in men with prostate cancer; and a multi-phase study of health-related quality of life in young adults with testicular cancer. He has also been involved in a number of independent and collaborative projects including a meta-analysis of treatment trials for depression in cancer patients. His work has been published in numerous peer-reviewed journals including Health Psychology, Cancer, JNCI, and Annals of Behavioral Medicine. He has received competitive funding for his work including awards from the Lance Armstrong Foundation and the UCLA Cousins Center for Psychoneuroimmunology.

Inaugural Class of APOS Fellows



Terry Badger PhD, PMHCNS-BC, RN, FAAN

Dr Badger is Professor and Director of the Community and Systems Health Science Division at The University of Arizona College of Nursing, Professor in the Department of Psychiatry, and member of The University of Arizona Cancer Center. Her research is in the area of psychological distress, dyadic interdependence between emotional states of breast and prostate cancer survivors and members of their social network, and telephone psychosocial interventions. She is the current Past-President of APOS.



Wayne A Bardwell PhD, MBA

Dr Bardwell is Associate Professor of Psychiatry in the University of California San Diego School of Medicine, and Director of the Patient and Family Support Service and the Doris A. Howell Palliative Care Service at the Moores UCSD Cancer Center. Dr Bardwell's research focuses on understanding links between physiological and psychosocial (depression, fatigue, sleep) functioning in chronic medical illness.

Dr Bardwell's clinical experience has included conducting individual and group psychotherapy for adult inpatients and outpatients with chronic and life-threatening medical illnesses. He is the current President of APOS.



Donna B Greenberg MD

Dr Greenberg is Director, Psychiatric Oncology Service at the Massachusetts General Hospital. Her specialties include psychiatric oncology and behavioral sciences and neuro-oncology. Dr Greenberg is a past president and treasurer of APOS. Dr Greenberg has been an active supporter of APOS since its inception.



Jimmie C Holland MD

Dr Holland, recognized internationally as the founder of the subspecialty of psychooncology, is Attending Psychiatrist and holds the first endowed chair in Psychiatric Oncology, the Wayne E. Chapman Chair at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center (MSKCC). She is Professor of Psychiatry at Weill Medical College of Cornell University. She began the first full-time Psychiatric Service in a cancer hospital in

1977 at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, and in 1996, she became the first woman chair of a clinical department at MSKCC. From this base, the concept of psycho-oncology evolved to become a nationally recognized subspecialty of oncology. The Department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences has trained over 300 psychologists and psychiatrists in both clinical and research areas. Dr Holland was PI of the first research training grant in psycho-oncology, which has continued uninterrupted for 29 years. Dr Holland is the Founding President of the International Psycho-Oncology Society (1984) and of APOS (1986).



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Paul B Jacobsen PhD

Dr Jacobsen is Associate Center Director for Population Science at Moffitt and Professor of Psychology and Oncologic Sciences at the University of South Florida. For the past 25 years, his work has focused on using knowledge from the behavioral and social sciences to promote reductions in cancer risk, early detection of cancer, and improvements in quality of life following cancer diagnosis. In 2008 Dr Jacobsen

received the Bernard Fox Memorial Award for outstanding contributions to psychosocial oncology from the International Psycho-Oncology Society, and in 2010 he received the Holland Distinguished Leadership Award from the APOS. He is a past president of APOS and is closely involved in the society's efforts to develop and promote quality standards for psychosocial care of cancer patients.



Matthew J Loscalzo LCSW

Professor Loscalzo is the Liliane Elkins Professor in Supportive Care Programs in the Department of Supportive Care Medicine and Professor in Department of Population Sciences. He is also the Executive Director of the Department of Supportive Care Medicine and the Administrative Director of the Sheri & Les Biller Patient and Family Resource Center at the City of Hope-National Medical Center, Duarte California.

Professor Loscalzo has over 30 years experience in caring for cancer patients and their families. He is recognized internationally as a pioneer in the clinical, educational, and research domains of psychosocial aspects of cancer. Professor Loscalzo is a past president of APOS and the Association of Oncology Social Work. His areas of focus have been pain and palliative care, the implementation of problem-based screening programs, gender-based medicine and problem solving therapies.



Ruth McCorkle PhD, FAAN

Dr McCorkle is the Florence S. Wald Professor of Nursing at the Yale School of Nursing, Professor of Epidemiology, and is Assistant Director of Psychosocial Oncology Research at the Yale Comprehensive Cancer Center. A leader in cancer nursing, education and cancer control research, Dr McCorkle has done landmark research on the psychosocial ramifications of cancer. Dr McCorkle has had continuous

funding from the National Institutes of Health since 1983. She is the principle investigator of "An Intervention to Improve Outcomes in patients with Advanced Cancer," a grant funded by the National Institute of Nursing Research. She was awarded the first biomedical institutional training grant from the National Cancer Institute in Psychosocial Oncology at the University of Washington in 1983. Subsequently she has been the program director on institutional training grants at both University of Pennsylvania and is currently the co-director at Yale University. Dr McCorkle joined the faculty of the Yale School of Nursing in 1998 to assume a leadership of the doctoral program and was the founding Director of the Center for Excellence in Chronic Illness. Dr McCorkle is a past president of APOS.



Peter Trask PhD, MPH

Dr Trask received his PhD in Clinical Psychology from the University of Maine. As a fellow in Behavioral Medicine at the University of Michigan, he began a research program focused on assessing and treating emotional distress and changes in quality of life in individuals diagnosed with cancer. He continued this research, and provided therapy to cancer patients, as a faculty member at the University of Michigan. In 2003, Dr Trask became Assistant Professor of Research at Brown University in the Centers

for Behavioral and Preventive Medicine. He was subsequently employed in the Outcomes Research group in the Oncology Business Unit at Pfizer. He was responsible for developing strategies for assessing health economic and patient-reported outcomes for multiple early and late phase oncology compounds. He has continued this work as Director in Oncology in the Global Evidence and Value Development group at Sanofi. Dr Trask is a past recipient of the APOS New Investigator award, a past treasurer and president of APOS, and continues to give back to the organization as part of the Membership Committee.



Alan Valentine MD

Dr Valentine is Professor and Chair, Department of Psychiatry, the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. He served as APOS President in 2004 and was the recipient of the 2009 Holland Distinguished Leadership Award.



Deane L Wolcott MD

Dr Wolcott is a psychiatrist who has spent most of his professional life leading and supporting the development of supportive care services in the hospital cancer program environment. He is currently Director of Oncology Supportive Care Services at the Samuel Oschin Comprehensive Cancer Institute at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. He has been an active member of APOS since

its inception and is a past president of APOS. He has also been a member of the Professional Advisory Board of the Cancer Support Community. He has served as Program Chair for the 2013 APOS 10th Annual Conference. Dr Wolcott is strongly committed to the multidisciplinary team model of oncology supportive care services.



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
